

AFRICAN PROVERBS COPYWORK

Overview

Each African country study includes a carefully selected African proverb to encourage handwriting practice and discussion.

Students may complete the proverb activity using one of three formats:

- Print Tracework Sheet
- Cursive Tracework Sheet
- Copywork & Reflection Sheet

Families and educators can choose the format that best supports their child's handwriting level and developmental stage.

Materials Needed:

- Selected proverb page (print or cursive tracework or copywork version)
- Pencil
- Colored pencils or crayons (for illustration)

How to Use the Tracework Pages (Print or Cursive):

- Read the proverb aloud. Discuss any unfamiliar vocabulary.
- Ask: What do you think this means?
- Connect the proverb to a real-life situation, a character from a book, etc.
- Encourage slow, neat tracing.
- Students draw a picture above the proverb to illustrate its meaning.

How to Use the Copywork Sheet:

- Read the proverb aloud. Discuss any unfamiliar vocabulary.
- Ask: What do you think this means?
- Connect the proverb to a real-life situation, a character from a book, etc.
- Encourage neat handwriting and proper punctuation.
- Students write what they believe the proverb means.
- Younger students may wish to dictate their response.
